BOOK REVIEW

Bradley, Ian L. Twentieth Century Canadian Composers. v.l. Agincourt, Ont.: GLC Publishers, 1977. 222p. \$16.95. ISBN 0-88874-052-2.

In the preface to the first volume of <u>Twentieth Century Canadian Composers</u>, Ian Bradley states that his aim is "to provide help and guidance to teachers and students seeking an introduction to music written by Canadians." Certainly he has brought together an impressive amount of material to document the case for "an emerging Canadian identity" in the field of music. He has selected ten of Canada's foremost musicians of this century and presents a representative sampling of their work for study.

Each chapter includes biographical material as well as analysis of the music itself. Most of these works have been recorded by the CBC and

are available in the Canadian Collection or on other record labels listed in the discography. Unfortunately, the music scores themselves are not as well documented. A bibliography of the works discussed would make future volumes more valuable.

To the basic text the author has appended a bibliography "for teachers and students anxious to pursue the study of Canadian music in greater depth...," as well as a discography of most of the works discussed in each chapter.

Attention should be called to the quality of the physical format of the volume. It is a joy to read with its clear, crisp type and excellent music engraving. This reviewer has no hesitation in recommending the work for introductory Canadian music courses and for all music libraries. It is to be hoped that companion volumes of the same high quality will soon follow.
